Tēnā Koutou Katoa, Greetings to you,

The New Zealand Catholic Bishops have published a review of a document first published in 1997. The document is Te Kahu o te Ora, A Consistent Ethic of Life. For a document addressing something as fundamental as "life", it might be reasonable to assume that little would be changed after 30 years. But the world has certainly moved on and new questions have arisen for us to consider in the light of Catholic morality and ethics.

In some matters there has been no change. From the first book in the Hebrew scriptures, Genesis, through to the last book in the Christian Bible, we have a proclamation that every human life has inestimable value and inbuilt dignity. We also have the ultimate affirmation for humanity when God becomes human, like us in every way but for sin.

Life therefore cannot be "valued" as an economic or social construct. Our human value does not depend upon our usefulness or potential usefulness. People have the same value, irrespective of where they are on the journey of life towards God. However, this does not provide us with an "out" when it comes to considering the quality of life. Given their value, all people are deserving of a quality life, irrespective of their circumstance.

We have ventured into new ethical territory at the start and end of our earthly life in the last 30 years. Questions around defining gender and sexuality are arising earlier in life. Assisted death is now available in New Zealand. A consistent ethic of life requires us to resource palliative care in a manner that recognises the dignity of the person and to avoid any sense of a message that they are no longer valued because they are no longer productive. At the other end of the journey, a consistent ethic of life requires us to treat each child with dignity as they journey with their questions relating to sexuality and gender.

Education is not simply an investment for the future, but a fundamental right to promote a quality life for a student. In our Catholic context, that requires us to resource some students more than others, to enable a quality life for them. A consistent ethic of life informs us that we must value each student equally, while equity (fairness) requires us to respond to each in a unique way.

Some people think that consistency is about providing the same input and expecting the same outcome from each student. When that does not happen, there should be a consistent consequence for those who have failed to attain the desired outcome. This is far removed from an approach guided by a consistent ethic of life. Consistency relates to "life" and not "consequence". Decisions need to be made such that the innate dignity of all parties is recognised and upheld.

In a punitive society, decisions made in the above manner can appear to be "soft" and out-of-touch of the impact upon victims. Old-schools and prisons evidence that the punitive approach does not bring about a sustained change in behaviour. They tend to devalue a person's life and convey a message that they are a lesser person. Consequently, they join up with other "lesser" persons and the gang culture continues to thrive.

The document gives consideration to the emergence of Artificial Intelligence and Social Media. These things were not impacting upon the world in a manner that they do today. Many of the applications did not exist. The prevalence of such systems influences our understanding of truth and our access to resources in the world today. They can also lead to the accumulation of resources being held by only a few.

We still have debate about the ethics of War, Poverty, Racism, Discrimination and Abuse being addressed in the document. There has been a change in emphasis in many of these areas and what was considered to be ethical many years ago, such as the intentional killing of civilians during war, is now found to be inconsistent with an ethic for life. COLLEGE ACCOUNTS

We are nearly at the end of Term 4, so we would like to ask families that your school account is paid by 8th December.

Many thanks to those families who have already paid their account in full, or have a regular payment in place.

A friendly reminder from the Auckland Diocese for parents and caregivers of *students who will be leaving Pompallier Catholic College at the end of this year;* Attendance Dues must be paid in full by 1st December 2023. Families who have an on-going AP are I exempt from this date but must commit to continuing I payments until the account is paid.

Failure to pay the account or make contact with the College Office to arrange alternative methods of payment, may result in the overdue account being sent to Debtworks NZ Ltd for default listing at credit reporting agencies.



OVERDUE LIBRARY & SUBJECT BOOKS

There are a number of overdue library books, and subject textbooks outstanding.

Students - if you have received an overdue library book notice and/or been issued a subject textbook during the year and have not yet returned them, please do so **before the end of this term,** to avoid being charged for the cost of the book.

STUDYLINK 2024

Apply before 16 December you can't miss it.

If you're studying in 2024, 16 December is a very important date. It's one you just can't miss.

Around 120,000 students will need to get organised for study in 2024. Apply for your student allowance or loan before 16 December to give yourself the best chance of having everything sorted and ready for the start of your course.

If you've had a student allowance or loan in the last 12 months, login to MyStudyLink and use the Returning Application to apply. It'll take less than five minutes.

2024 BUS INFORMATION

Pompallier Catholic College buses will begin running **from Wednesday 31st January 2024** on all of our school routes. **However**, the students who use other schools' buses to connect to ours should check with their bus company to confirm their start date.

There may be changes to bus services early in the new year to allow for changes in our school population. We do our best to accommodate as many of our students as possible, within the guidelines set by the Ministry of Education. All changes will be notified as soon as possible.

All services are under review by the Ministry of Education, and will be confirmed at the beginning of 2024. Once finalised, details will be available on the transport pages of our College website: www.pompallier.school.nz.

A reminder that eligibility is dependent on where a student lives, available public services in the area, and loading limits.

Student ID's also double as your bus pass, and these will be issued in the first few weeks of the new year. Until then, no pass is required.

Back to School 2024

HOW DO I ORDER MY STATIONERY?

We team up with OfficeMax to make Back to School easy!

We DO NOT issue stationery lists to students. This is because all your child's school stationery list requirements are uploaded online at <u>myschool.co.nz</u>, to make it easy for you to purchase your child's back to school requirements. Simply search for our school, select your child's class and/or subject lists and follow the instructions on the easy-to-use website.

Buying through OfficeMax MySchool also **earns School Rewards for our school,** which we can redeem for much needed educational supplies, equipment for our classrooms, or to help those students in need.

Stationery is delivered to your home (or a designated address) by courier. This means that ordering is quick and easy, stationery lists are not lost and the correct products are obtained.

OfficeMax also have a Laybuy payment option, so you can pay in 6 weekly, interest-free payments - and still get your order right away. Or you can pay by internet banking, credit card or debit card.

If you prefer, you can call the OfficeMax MySchool team on 0800 724 440, Monday to Friday, 8:30am to 5:00pm.

Delivery is free for orders over \$46.00 (incl. GST).

The website will "go live" for ordering stationery on Thursday 30th November.

We encourage you to order early to ensure your child has all their stationery requirements ready to go for the start of Term 1. Don't wait until mid-January - order now and avoid the back to school rush!

All students are expected to have their stationery requirements on the first day of Term 1 (Wednesday 31st January), as teaching will begin on that day.

TO ORDER ONLINE:

1. Go to <u>www.myschool.co.nz</u>, enter Pompallier into the School Name field, then select Pompallier Catholic College.

- 2. Click on "Start"
- 3. Enter Students First Name, Last Name & Year Level
- 4. Select the Subjects required
- 5. Click the "View Requirements List" button
- 6. Review the list, adding or deleting items as required. You may also add additional stationery items
- 7. When finished, click "Shopping Cart"
- 8. You now have the option to add another student, otherwise select "Checkout"

If items are unavailable at the time you order, these will be placed on backorder and delivered to you as soon as they arrive. This will be indicated on your delivery docket

- 9. Follow the online instructions to enter your delivery address details and payment options
- 10. Save a copy of the order and retain it for your records. Note your Order Number, as this will be required if you need to return items

TO SHOP IN A STORE:

- 1. Follow steps 1 through 7 to establish which items you require
- 2. Print the requirement list
- 3. Take the list to your preferred stationery supplies store

CONDITIONS:

- Please allow up to ten working days for delivery. Orders placed after 15th January 2024 may result in delays and OfficeMax cannot guarantee delivery before school starts on late orders.

- 3. Incorrect items can only be returned by first contacting Customer Services on the 0800 number. You will need to quote your Order Number.
