Tēnā Koutou Katoa, Greetings to you,

Make it a number one please.

As the years pass, the boys in our family end up with either thinning hair and bald patches, or curly gray hair. It is the genetics of mum's family or dad's family at play. In my earlier years a haircut would bring comments about how thick my hair was and I would be asked whether I prefer a number three or four for a haircut. Now I get asked if I want a two or one and I wear a hat more often. The ravages of time take their toll on many things if we are on earth long enough.

It should come as no surprise to find that this reality is explored in the Bible. A book of its size and with an authorship spanning 600 years, one would reasonably expect a few themes to be covered.

When it came to nice skin and great hair, Absalom, the son of King David, would have had his picture on the cover of Vogue in 980 BC. He had fantastic hair. Not only was it thick and dark, though artists often show it as brown, he also let it grow and cut it only once a year when it got too heavy for him. He liked to weigh it when it was cut. Usually it was around 1.5 kg.

From the top of his head to the sole of his Crocs there was no blemish on him (2 Samuel 14:25). Great skin and great hair. To compliment his good looks, he invested in a fancy chariot and a team of horses. It was an historic Ferrari Stradale. He also had the measure of 900 BC social media by having fifty footmen run ahead of him to let people know about his importance.

Absalom knew all about media management. Every morning he would take that chariot to the city gate mosh pit to have, metaphorically speaking, selfies with generation CM BC. One of the early "influencers", Absalom had a social agenda focusing on overthrowing his father and installing himself as King.

When he had enough followers on his social media account he made up a story for his father and headed out of town. He took with him his fathers PR manager and worked on his strategic plan to become King. By this time, via his good looks, fast car, intelligence and media campaign, he had most of Israel supporting him. His dad, King David, had to leave the capital of Jerusalem. But what Absalom did not know was that his PR manager was acting as a double agent for his father. It never entered Absalom's head that someone would rate his father ahead of himself.

The family dispute gave rise to a war. Using the information provided by his double agent, David's army annihilated Absalom's army. Absalom fled the scene on a mule (no more flash car) through the forests of Ephraim, where his beauty got the better of him. His long waxy hair got caught in tree branches, leaving him dangling off the ground. David's general got to him, stabbed him, and tossed him into a hole. For good measure he filled it over with stones.

When David's army returns to its camp, the first question he asks is about his son, "Is he safe?"

He did not get a straight answer until he had asked the question three times. When he finally gets the news he did not want to hear, David is distraught. "If only I had died instead of you" he laments.

How often do we hear this story where the "off the rails" child is the one who generates the most pain for the parent? It is not the well behaved and successful child that creates pain, it is the one who fails no matter how much love we invest in them.

The Bible has many stories of this nature. It should not be surprising therefore to discover that this same pain and intent is found in the person of God. God loves and forgives. God moves towards us, no matter how dysfunctional and messed up we make our life. As with David and Absalom, the state of our righteousness is not the focus. It is the overwhelming love of God for his people.

We are moving closer to that time when we recall that Jesus was betrayed and on that very night prayed that we might know what it means to be loved by God with the intensity Jesus experienced. A love that sets aside our failures and is not conditional upon how good we are. If our mission on earth is to be good enough to earn God's love, we will constantly fail, as it is based upon a misunderstanding. God sees us in all our failings and constantly desires to be reconciled with us. If King David could do it, God must do it even better.

WORLD DAY OF PRAYER Ecumenical Service at St Francis Xavier Friday 1 March, 2024

Last Friday, two of our senior students, Angel Lucas and Mischy Disu, accompanied by Mrs Monica Johnson, attended the World Day of Prayer service at St Francis Xavier Catholic Church.

World Day of Prayer is an international movement of Christian people in many different traditions that have a continuing relationship of prayer and service. People from various denominations gather in one another's churches to celebrate, using a service prepared by women of a different country each year.

It was started by a group of women in the United States in 1887 and has grown to include over 180 countries and regions worldwide. In New Zealand, the first nationwide worship service was held in 1931.

Each year the service is written by women in a different country and it affirms that informed prayer and prayerful action are inseparable.

The theme for 2024 from Palestinian Christian women, was: I beg you... bear with one another in love. An ecumenical group of Palestinian Christian women have prayed and reflected together over the past several years and responded to the invitation to write the 2024 program. Their theme was based on Ephesians 4:1-7. This program calls us to bear with each other in love, despite all difficulties and oppression. The service shared stories of three Palestinian Christian women, who witness to the power of bearing together in love. One of the stories was read by Angela and Mischy.
