Tēnā Koutou Katoa, Greetings to you,

Of Bunnies and Buns.

I like Easter and I like chocolate. I have been forever grateful to the person who made a link between Easter and chocolate so many years ago. Some sources date this to Germany and France in the early 1800's, while others link it to Joseph Fry of England in 1873. Choose either or neither, what is more important is that it was before my birth.

Some of my earliest memories are of having a chocolate easter egg on Easter Sunday. We knew they were in the house, but they were not available unless we had attended Mass on Good Friday and Easter Sunday. Given the length of these liturgies, I always thought the reward was justified. I had used a lot of energy, kneeling, standing, praying, listening and sometimes singing at these two liturgies.

I had also given things up during Lent and donated some pennies towards the babies in Africa, according to the label and picture on the tin. Each classroom in my Catholic primary had a small tin where students could make such a donation. There was a competition run between the four classes to see who could raise the most money. I liked the competition as the winning class received some lollies and had some "free time" from regular school.

Easter, Christmas and Lent (if our class won) were all events that I looked forward to when I was younger, as they brought good things into my life. The reward was high and the cost was low. That was very acceptable to me.

Many years later, Easter still brings good things into my life. The reward is now greater than what I thought I was getting as a child, while the personal cost to me looks different now. I can still get the chocolate eggs or bunnies, along with hot cross buns, but I now appreciate, and believe, that Easter is much more than bunnies and buns.

The passage of time has made me far more aware of the reality of evil/sin in the world and the victory of Christ who became man to address this reality. Evil does not walk around with a long tail, pointy ears, red eyes and a pitchfork. It is not a person, it is a presence, and a very subtle one most of the time. Its intent is to alienate us and others from the loving presence of God.

Evil tends to get a free hit in the presence of natural disasters, because it is hard to reconcile a God or creation and love with the impact of a Tsunami or Earthquake upon people. But it does even better when it can find fertile ground in our humanity and orientate our behaviour towards things such as: promotion of self importance (Adam and Eve), revenge (Samson), the distrust of others (siblings of Joseph) and a failure to discern truth (Pharisees).

Under the right set of circumstances an individual or collective entity is pretty much capable of anything. Both good and bad. Goodness and evil do not come with a recognisable label. The recent scandals relating to sexual abuse within the Catholic church evidences this, and reminds us that we all need a healthy distrust of our own inclinations to presume goodness and righteousness to be present within an entity, an individual, or even within ourself.

The good news of Easter is that Christ shows us a path through the presence of evil. It is a path that is hard to stay on unless we have faith in God and take to heart (and head) Saint Paul's message that "...in all things God works for the good of those who love him" (Romans 8:28).

Christ showed to us that evil (sin) can be overcome. It was not self-evident to the disciples when they gathered with Jesus at the Mount of Olives and even less evident 24 hours later. It was not until the Holy Spirit became present that these men became liberated from doubt and despair. God tends to work that way. Things do take time because God works with and through our imperfect humanity.

However, Easter enables the rewards to keep coming and I know the cost is both universal and individual. The real cost of Easter falls upon Jesus and those who give witness to his kingdom of truth, justice and peace in the world today.

May God continue to bless and strengthen all those transformational people who bring Easter to us without heeding the cost. They are the people who are putting Christ in Pompallier Catholic College today. May they continue to do so in the years ahead.

YEAR 12 CREATIVE WRITING WORKSHOP ...

On Wednesday 27 March the Year 12 English students visited Kiwi North Museum in Maunu to explore and create a beautifully crafted creative writing piece, using the many artifacts and photographs as their inspiration.

Kiwi North is a treasure trove of historic artifacts and photographs that vividly depict the growth and development of Whangārei over the years. Exhibits ranging from Māori artifacts to World War memorabilia provide a comprehensive narrative of the town's evolution.

- When the school hours are over, go out as you came in softly and decemly.
- When you are out of school go home without noise and without delay: do not run or loiter but do this as all things else with discretion.
- Do not speak at home or abroad of what has been done at school, but make yourself perfect in your task.
